


Precolonial or Colonial?

Spanish settlers brought domesticated animals with them when building the first colony in St. Augustine.













Plant and Animal Domestication Centers

Domestication is the process of adapting wild plants and animals for human use. Domestic species are raised for food, work, clothing, medicine, and many other uses. Domesticated plants and animals must be raised and cared for by humans. Domesticated species are not wild*. The map below shows where some plants and animals that you may eat today were originally domesticated.

1. This animal is originally from Southeast Asia, but it didn't just "cross the road" to get here.
3. This plant comes from Mexico. You may have eaten it on the cob.
5. This vegetable is often made into french fries but comes from South America.
7. You might be surprised that this fruit comes from Southeastern Asia. It's Florida's official state fruit.
8. This long, yellow fruit comes from Southeast Asia. You might find it in an ice cream sundae.
9. This grain was originally domesticated in East Africa. We use it to make bread.

2. Giddy-up! This animal was first domesticated in Southwest Asia.
3. This sweet treat was domesticated in South America. It's also called cacao.
4. This animal was domesticated in the Fertile Crescent and brought to the Americas by the Spanish. You could say it moo-ved a very long way!
